Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival Receives Premier's Award for Tourism



The Premier's Award for Tourism

The Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival has just received the 2011 Premier's Award for Tourism in recognition of its long-standing contribution to tourism and culture in Prince Edward Island. The award was presented by Tourism and Culture Minister, Robert Vessey, during the Tourism Industry Association of PEI 30th Annual Conference

and Awards Gala Dinner at the Charlottetown Rodd Hotel on March 2nd, 2011.

The prestigious award is presented annually to tourism operators or attractions who have moved the industry forward and inspired others to do the same. The Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival was chosen because it is a long-standing cultural festival that has attracted thousands of visitors to the Island for over three decades.

"The Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival has helped the Island become a destination for cultural tourism and we are pleased to recognize its 35 years of operation," said Minister Vessey.


The weather co-operated for the organizers of

Stayed Tuned Instrument Repair and Piano Tuning




There is no doubt that the name Lester Stubbert has become synonymous with Celtic music in PEI. The Cape Breton native is just one of those guys that can

pick up and play any instrument with strings...and play it well. Of course, we've come to know him best for his fancy guitar picking and versatile piano playing. But not only is he a talented musician, he is also a highly skilled and experienced carpenter.

Over the years, between his own instruments and those of his music students and close friends, Lester has tried his hand at small repairs and adjustments, the installing of new electronics and even one day decided to try and tune his own piano! Marrying the two things he knows best, music and carpentry, just seemed to make a whole lot of sense

and the more he did it, the more he enjoyed the work. It was also becoming obvious that there was a large void on the Island in the areas of instrument repair and piano



tuning. For this reason, Lester set out to educate himself as much as he possibly could on everything related to stringed instruments.

With a large amount of time and money invested in the proper tools, supplies and education, he took on a few projects to get himself started.



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Without even promoting what he was doing, people had guitars and fiddles for him to fix everywhere he went it seemed! He accepted all challenges from smashed guitars to old fiddles and everything in between. He's been busy over the past year fixing, learning and honing his skills, making instrument owners very happy all across PEI.

Stubbert is now ready to officially launch "Stay Tuned Instrument Repair & Piano Tuning", which he operates out of his home in Brooklyn, just outside of Montague. From luthier services to tuning pianos to simply restringing a guitar or re-hairing a bow, Lester is set up for any kind of job you can bring him.

"He knows what instruments should sound like and how they should feel when played which is what sets him apart I think. He understands how music works as well as the technical side of things" says fiddler Sheila FitzPatrick. "I've been very happy with the work he's done on both my fiddles."
